This half term, our focus text has been 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'. We have been very excited to introduce our own caterpillars into the Nursery! We have learned all about the life cycle of butterflies and this has been the perfect opportunity to watch it happening in the classroom!
























The children have also learned about Giuseppe Arcimboldo this term and had a lot of fun creating fruit faced portraits!













This half term, in Reception, it has been very exciting and we have had lots of visitors come in to meet us! We started our topic with a visit from Miss Carolyn from the RSPCA. She talked to us about how to look after our pets – remembering three key things: feeding them, walking them and ensuring they visit the vets. The children also pretended they were vets too.









We then had Lola (Mrs Salih's dog) and Lenny (Mrs Hulme's pony) visit us at school. Our visitors came with their owners, who shared how they look after their animals, and the children got the chance the meet them close up!







The children have also been working hard on growing lots of different vegetables and flowers in the EYFS garden. Take a look on our playground...it looks amazing!















This half term, the children have had lots of fun in the lovely sunshine. They even had an ice-lolly treat from Miss Hughes!





In maths, the children have been measuring capacity and volume. They have also started to learn their times tables which they are very excited about. Remember, the children can use Times Tables Rock Stars to practise their tables at home and they also have had log ins for NumBots so they can practice subitising, addition and subtraction.



In science, the children have been learning about plants and trees. They planted their own vegetable seeds, but we are still waiting for them to grow.















In Science, we explored what plants need to grow and survive, learning about the importance of sunlight, water, air, and the right temperature. To test our understanding, we planted cress seeds and observed how they grew under different conditions. It was fascinating to see the impact of light, water, and warmth on plant growth, and we enjoyed tracking the changes over time.

In Art, we focused on monochromatic colour schemes and the use of patterns. Inspired by this, the children designed their own henna-style patterns, carefully applying what they had learned about repetition and detail. The results were creative, intricate, and beautifully individual.









This half term, year 3 began preparing for our sports day in PE by participating in our athletics topic. We've practiced our balancing, coordination and reaction time. On the track, we've been running 100m and 400m and practicing the hurdles and skipping. In field events, we've been practicing our javelin, shotput and long jump.







We have also been busy in maths, working on fractions. We have learnt about numerators and denominators. We have also compared and ordered unit and non- unit fractions.









We moved onto our new design and technology topic looking at cross stitching. This term, we looked at designing a cushion and then the children created them. They learnt lots of new skills through this topic, including: threading a needle, stuffing the cushion and stitching the cushion using both the running stitch and cross stitch.





We launched our new topic, 'The Romans' in school and the children had the opportunity to dress up and take part in lots of exciting activities. We also had a wonderful day out at the Grosvenor Museum in Chester.

In our English lessons, we have been learning how to write an explanation on the human digestive system. We've had lots of fun discussing how our food travels from our mouth through the various organs in our body and then into the toilet!






In Maths, we have continued with our decimals unit. The children are feeling much more confident with decimals now and are well prepared to move onto money. The children cannot believe there are actually numbers in between whole numbers!






Despite the term being only 4 weeks, we have certainly packed a lot into each week. We have completed two whole maths units! We have learnt about coordinates, reflection and translations as well as negative numbers. Our writing unit has focused on writing up a science experiment and has enabled the children to use their instructional writing skills from last term in the process.









Reading this term has focused on the United States of America. We have read about the geography of the country and how varied its landscape is. We have also learnt about the economy of the USA. We have focused heavily on vocabulary and word meaning questions this term as well as retrieval skills. This knowledge will really help with our next geography topic, all about the west coast of America.

Science this half term has been all about properties of materials and how they can change. We have managed to fit in a lot of exciting experiments where they have explored dissolving, changing state, insulation, magnetism and how materials can be separated. They have had to use their skills of working scientifically to plan, carry out and then evaluate their experiments. The children have loved being able to work practically in science and it has brought the subject to life. Here are some pictures of our experiments.

They approached the tests with determination, focus, and maturity, and we couldn't be prouder of each and every one of you. 




Message from the Assistant Principal:



















### Find a cosy spot and enjoy these book recommendations from some of our teachers!
