














A big welcome to our new Rising 3 children starting in January 2026!

The children have worked so hard this term and have embraced every new challenge with excitement and enthusiasm. We have seen so much progress made and have really got to know the children.

Reading Magic

Maths

The children have made fantastic progress with their maths skills this term. We have been learning all about the numbers 1 and 2, exploring what they look like, how to represent them, and how to use them in simple activities. We have also begun learning about patterns and discovering how to create our own repeating patterns using colours, shapes, and objects. The children have really enjoyed these hands-on learning experiences.

We have also enjoyed a variety of Christmassy activities, which have brought plenty of excitement and festive cheer to our classroom. It has been a very busy half term for Reception where we have been celebrating lots of different things and learning about how people celebrate all over the world. We started our celebrations topic off with a teddy bears picnic, where we enjoyed party games, biscuits and dancing. The children talked about their own birthdays and we shared lots of pictures of them celebrating. Next, we looked at celebrations such as Bonfire night, Remembrance day and Christmas. We took part in lots of activities learning all about these celebrations and made lots of lovely creations in art. To wrap up our topic, we have been learning all about the Christmas story, the children were absolutely fantastic in their Nativity, recreating the story of Christmas.



The children have been working really hard in Literacy this half term. We have now introduced all of the first set of sounds and children are beginning to use them in their writing. We have been listening for initial sounds and writing CVC words. The children have also been challenged to write a caption. We have had lots of fabulous writing this half term and we are very proud of the progress the children are making.

















We have been incredibly busy with our maths learning this half term. Our main focus has been on numbers up to 5. We have looked at subitising our numbers and also the composition of the numbers. The children have worked really well with their partners when using tens frames and part whole models for the first time. We have also practised number formation with the children using maths whiteboards and rhymes to help them remember.

























This half term, we have looked at how toys have changed over the last 60 years. We had a fun afternoon playing with old fashioned toys and we brought in our favourite toys. We became 'History Detectives', researched what toys were like when our older relatives were younger, and we compared our toys with theirs.







In maths, we have been exploring 2D and 3D shapes. The children have enjoyed hands-on activities where they sorted shapes based off their properties such as number of sides, corners and faces. We have also been learning about common shapes such as squares, triangles and circles. We have put our artistic skills to the test by designing pictures using only shapes – there were some fantastic robots, houses and animals! We even played some fun games to spot shapes in our classroom and around school, helping us see how shapes are everywhere.







In Design and Technology the children have started creating their own 3D toys using recycled materials. Before starting, they carefully planned their designs, thinking about what their toy would look like and which materials would work the best. We explored how everyday items can be reused in creative ways, helping us learn about sustainability and caring for our environment. They have been developing their joining skills using masking tape and glue to attach parts securely. It has been great to see their problem-solving skills in action.









We also celebrated Children in Need with Challenge 25! The children were full of energy as we joined Joe Wicks for his exciting fitness challenges. Everyone worked hard to complete 25 different exercises. We also talked about why Children in Need is special and how our efforts help children across the UK.













In Art this term, the classes have been exploring monochromatic patterns. The children learned how designers use pattern in their artwork and in celebrations around the world. They also investigated abstract and geometric shapes, experimenting with how these can be combined to create a visual impact. Bringing all of this together, the children designed and created their very own mehndi-style patterns, showcasing creativity, careful pattern work, and growing confidence in their artistic choices. We are so proud of their fantastic designs!









Year 2 had a wonderful time on their autumn walk this term, exploring the outdoors and looking for signs of the new season. The children excitedly spotted colourful falling leaves and noticed how the air felt crisp and fresh. It was a fantastic opportunity for the class to use their observation skills, enjoy nature, and bring their learning about autumn to life.















This half term, the Key Stage has been busy exploring creativity, reflection, and celebration through a range of meaningful activities. We worked together to create a collaborative piece of artwork for Remembrance Day, giving us an important opportunity to reflect on all those who lost their lives and to honour their memory. The children also created thoughtful thank-you cards, allowing them to express gratitude to the people who mean the most to them.











In writing lessons, we are also learning about the features of a letter and using a familiar story (The Stone Age Boy), to inspire our letter writing.

In maths, we have been learning about multiplication and division. We have learnt how to group and share. We are smashing our times tables using Times Tables Rockstars and our scores are improving every week!






In PE, we have been learning how to do an African dance. It was great fun!




It has been another busy half term in Year 4 and we're not done yet. We have loved practising for all the Christmas festivities and concerts as well as cramming in as much learning as possible. We even managed to fit in a trip to Cadbury's World for our topic on Chocolate.

As we come to the end of this half term and we prepare for the Christmas holidays, the Year 4 team would like to wish you and your family a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. The Year 4 Team [®]

Our main focus in maths this half term has been multiplication & division and measuring area by counting squares. There has been a big focus on the times tables and how to confidently apply the knowledge to problem solving and reasoning situations. We have taught them some tricks and tips to help them recall key multiplication and division facts for each times table so why not ask them to show you. Next half term, we continue with multiplication & division, but we will be learning how to use formal written methods for calculations.



Writing has focused on producing non-chronological reports about fictional extinct animals. There has been a heavy focus on ensuring that the children can write grammatically correct sentences which have a subject and a verb. The children really surprised us with how imaginative and creative they could be with their animal.

For the remainder of the term, we have looked at diaries and their features. The children have written diary entries as if they were one of the children who visited Willy Wonka's chocolate factory as one of the chosen 5. Again, we are focusing on making their sentences grammatically correct and interesting for the reader to read.



4P had the opportunity to attend Port Vale Carol Concert to sing to the local community. We were one of 7 schools that were invited to perform. The children sung beautifully and were a credit to Mill Hill. After the concert, the children had the chance to meet some of the players and get some autographs. There were a lot of very excited children.

Linking in with our study of Charlie & The Chocolate Factory in English, the children had the chance to become chocolatiers in Design & Technology lessons. They designed their own chocolate bark, chose ingredients for texture and taste and then designed the packaging to present their chocolate. The children made some weird, yet strangely delicious, combinations and thoroughly enjoyed the process and the tasting! We also went to Cadbury World in Birmingham to see a real working chocolate factory. The children had a chance to temper chocolate, doodle with melted chocolate and of course taste some of that yummy sweet deliciousness!





We continue to rehearse and learn the songs for the upcoming Young Voices concert in Manchester in February. We have had Miss Smith come in to school to help us learn the dances to the songs. The children can certainly move and have wowed us with their inner rock legend and their air guitar skills! It is shaping up to be a truly memorable experience for the children.

Science

Year 5 explored living things and their habitats. We learned about the seven life processes: movement, respiration, sensitivity, growth, reproduction, excretion, and nutrition. We investigated how mammals and plants reproduce. Mammals give birth to live young, while plants grow from seeds. Finally, we studied life cycles, seeing how living things change from birth to adulthood. It's been an exciting journey into the wonders of life!

We were lucky to have stick insects in our classroom, giving us a hands-on way to explore how living things thrive in their natural habitats.













D and T - Moonlight Magic


Recount letter





